The story also has many different episodes within it, such as Puri, who, as the book unfolds is an innocent young nun who finds out the truth of Franco's fascist regime in such a way that it makes you feel as if you are really there, working it out with her. When she discovers all of the clues, you yourself have to try and create a theory that makes sense. And it is only in part two of the book, when the characters have moved on by 15 years, that you find the truth confirmed. Although the book starts off quite slowly, as you get further into the story you are gripped more and more, making it almost impossible to put the book down.
